It has a model railroad museum and a prototype rail line. Freight traffic runs seven days a week and MARC traffic runs during the week. 

This is a good idea especially for structures you have already "planted" in your layout and that can't be moved, and of course is about the only route for the Electrical and Civil Engineer plus Scenery categories.


Just a reminder as to the definition of scratchbuilt: a model completely constructed by the applicant without the use of any commercial parts except: motor, gears, drivers/wheels, couplers, light bulbs, trucks, bell, marker and classification lights, valve gear, car brake fittings, and basic

wood/metal/plastic shapes. For a model to be considered as scratchbuilt motive power it must receive 11 points out of 15 in the scratchbuilt judging category. A car model must receive 14 points out of 15. There is no specific point value specified for structures.

The next contest will be this at the Regional convention next Fall... so keep building those models. Another reminder: please use the most current AP forms when entering models in the contest, since the new ones have space for the membership numbers (regional and national) as well as the membership expiration date. If you don't have access to the Internet to download these forms, please contact one of us and we'll be glad to provide them.

## Intimidation - Don't play that game

A strange title for an article in the model railroad press you ask? Not really. It came upon me as I tried a technique I saw in Allen Keller's third tape on George Sellios' *Franklin and South Manchester*. Some of the great results seen on famous layouts are just not that hard to do for ourselves. In my case, I saw how George gets the great weathered roof appearance on his layout. All Sellios does is dip his paint brush into a mixture of black India ink and rubbing alcohol and then dip it into a bit of Acrylic raw sienna from a tube. All I did is follow George's directions and apply his mixture to the roofs of my structures. The hardest part of Sellios' technique was assembling the few supplies available at any decent art supply store. In fact, doing a roof of one structure took less than two minutes from start to finish. The results were spectacular.

Another example of an easy technique that garners great reviews is to pour a bit of two-part epoxy on the roofs of your structures. Doug Gurin, of the Layout Design SIG, shared this one with me. Even though this technique takes only a few seconds to apply, the resulting "puddles" are what many viewers remember the most from their visit to your layout.

I point all this out this out because, if we can just isolate some factors stopping people from building their layouts, we just might make a valuable contribution to the Potomac Division's layout pool. In Keller's previously mentioned video, even George Sellios tells us some publications have shied from covering his layout because they feel it, might intimidate some readers. I think great modeling such as George's, instead, inspires most of us. It gets us to reach deep inside ourselves to reach ever better personal achievements in the hobby.

I recently visited Monroe Stewart's N-scale Hooch Junction layout in his suburban Maryland home.

There, Monroe shared this insight with me: he related how people can sometimes read between the lines of articles/editorials from commentators in the modeling press. Monroe holds the National Model Railroad Association's MMR designation. Stewart frets too many readers of the modeling press, rather than be inspired from what they read and see therein, often come away intimidated. By intimidated, Monroe believes they think their techniques, wallets, and fidelity- to-prototype just will not measure up against the efforts/abilities/results of others. Monroe's approach is to *just do it* as the Nike commercial tells us. Worse comes to worse, we may do a terrible job of it and start over again. But our efforts are not wasted, we have become a better modeler as a result. Another approach is that there are no modeling police to fine one for a less than perfect layout.

Try some of the techniques you read about in the hobby press or see demonstrated on a video tape and you just might be surprised at how good you are at it and how good it turns out.

Follow Monroe's advice, read the modeling press, but don't let experienced modelers or nit-pickers intimidate you. My particular caveat is that we give the same respect to those folks who get pleasure from replicating a railroad to an exact month and date as does Jack Burgess as we expect from them. Their way is fine too. Remember. *Just do it*.

Again we welcome another year and opportunity to display trains in the Virginia, Washington DC, and Maryland areas. We are fortunate to continue to display our various regions and eras of railroads we each depict. Many times over I have overheard our viewing public enthusiastically say they can not wait for next years layout and what it might bring. Many of our venues, are static in design, but when we incorporate our wyes and loops, the shapes do get interesting to plan and view.

A first time layout and smallest loop to date occurred at Jennings Chapel in Lisbon, Maryland. We were invited to display at their fall fund raising event courtesy of Art Wollam. All had a great time! It was difficult to decide on all the sandwiches and the deserts. You just have to "Love" those women that bake and donate for any organization, home made can rarely be beat! Another plus included seeing Maryland farmland, something we northern Virginians seem to blow by when on Maryland interstate.

Our Midi-Convention was a fantastic event! The module crew displayed a twenty-module layout with the N-Trak group in the social hall of St. Matthew's Church. Jerry McCrory not only debuted his modules, but also won "Most Favorite," and Dick Kafka's placing third as well! The clinics offered, afforded all the opportunity to either teach or learn new techniques. I had the opportunity to briefly listen to sand blasting and lightweight module building clinics. Both have changed the way I now create models, effect change in the model itself and module frame designs. Everyone that drags his or her modules around knows of the weight issue. Many watch each other in their setup and speedy tear down of those modules that so many of us come to admire. The support methods of legs range from EMT pipe to two by two inch pine, including the numerous nut/threaded insert attachment systems, always amazes me. I am one of those "oh no, I have to lift all that again?" Let me tell you, study Matt Chibarro's book and/or articles, you will learn that less is more.

Next came those layout tours. If you missed any or all of them, you missed opportunities of learning from the masters. Many of our hosts have authored or appeared in most of the model railroad magazines. While I missed several other great layouts, the rocky mountain layouts of Dick Patton and Andrew Dodge to the fall in New England of Paul Dolkos's layouts were fantastic. As a group, we are not taking advantage of the opportunities one has presented to them. Many layout tours are not visited for one reason or another, but what you are missing is unbelievable. Make the effort; you will surprise yourself with the opportunity to learn modeling methods and techniques. One does not have to

copy their road, but to witness the methods involved. I have judged modules and layouts three times, all the while learning why the builder did what they did and those methods utilized. One can read an article or book, but more is gained from seeing and asking how something was modeled.

Our annual showing at the Rockville Lions club continues, thanks in part to Ell Geib's continuing invitation. Our 47 module layout, designed by Bill Brandon, incorporated the loop-to-loop design, along with a walk-in area for show attendees. Bill's design permitted more show attendee room and viewing, courtesy of two custom inside curves he constructed. We always appreciate the ingenuity of our members in furthering our cause. Our DCC crew also tested itself with the continuous bugs and quirks that arise. A special "Thanks" to all those who continue to help! Continued assistance and participation from Ralph Douglas of the Piedmont railroaders is always appreciated. This venue also included four other scales, N-Trak, National Capital Trackers O gauge, Peter and Carol Jobush G gauge and the Southern Maryland Z gauge module of Ell Geib.

The Christmas fund raising extravaganza at the Fairfax Freight Station occurred on December 7th and 8th. Our twelve module layout ran well. This year is the first time I remember that we actually had snow, let alone temperatures not in the seventies. The garden railroaders proved most innovative, giving snowplow and snow blower demonstrations, while the rest of us enjoyed the confines of the heated station. 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
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

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
