

How to get there:



Clinics

The first three clinics are an early version of the 'Modeling with the MER Masters' series, a re-occurring series of clinics similar to NMRA Modeling with the Masters, but featuring MER talent, and far lower cost. If you register for clinic #3 you will have an opportunity to build the O scale structure kit from start to finish, complete with painting the doors and windows via airbrush, weathering the wood, and assembling the kit. HO freight cars, N freight cars, and some other "good junk" will be provided for those not registering for #3, or bring your own.

Clinic #1. How to Weather Wood (hands-on) Presented by Noll Horan

Various techniques of weathering wood will be described and demonstrated. Hands-on participation will focus on weathering the wood for the O-scale structure kit to be assembled in clinic #3 or bring your own.

Clinic # 2. Airbrushing: Whys and Wherefores in Model Railroading (hands-on) Presented by Clint Hyde.

Kinds of brushes, kinds of paints, kinds of materials, other tools. Hands-on participation will focus on painting the accessories for the O-scale structure kit. In addition, we'll weather a few

Clinic #3. Wood Scratch Building (hands-on, 3 hours) Presented by Martin Brechbiel.

freight cars with the airbrush, and some other

items. Held out doors, weather permitting.

Scratch build a semi-generic O scale small freight station/whistle stop/platform structure - board-by-board! All of the wood parts will be supplied cut to length or nearly so and with rudimentary instructions. The decking is supplied pre-stained along with some Grandt Line detail parts. Bring the tools you think you will need; sanding, cutting (saw or really sharp knife), drills would be a good idea, etc. Martin will bring his traveling tool bag/box, glues, pin vise. 70% of participants will be 90% done and 50% will be close to



100%. Don't ask how we figure. Maximum enrollment is 10 people. Detail parts shown are not included. \$10.00 extra fare. See page 4 for registration

I would like to encourage those of you that have not yet participated in the AP to give it a try. The easiest award to obtain is the Golden Spike Award. You can look up the requirements and get an application form on the NMRA web site

(http://www.nmra.org/achievement/gold.html). When you finish filling out the form, please contact me if you live in Virginia or Bill Roman if you live in Maryland so that arrangements can me made to view your work. The requirements for this award in a nutshell are (1) display 6 units of rolling stock; (2) construct a minimum of 8 square feet of layout; (3) construct five structures; (4) install three types of trackage that is ballasted and installed on proper roadbed; (5) wire the trackage so that two trains can be operated simultaneously, and; (6) provide one additional electrical feature.

The Division will have a model contest at the mini-convention April 30, 2005. The convention will open at 8:00 and the cut off for contest model entries will be 9:00. Categories for the model contest will be: Power Units: steam, diesel, and traction; Rolling Stock: passenger, freight, and caboose; Other: non- revenue car, structure, and display. The popular vote contest will include the previous categories plus Favorite Train and Favorite Module/display, plus a new category, Favorite model by a young modeler (less than 14 years old). We still need volunteers to help with judging, if you are interested please contact Bill Roman or me. Even if you have not judged before we will train you.

You can enter the mini- to get acquainted with what's involved in a contest and enter again at the Regional or National level. Models entered into the contest can be judged for NMRA AP merit points, but this is not a requirement of the contest. AP requirements, SOQ's and forms can be downloaded f r o m the NMRA web site (http://www.nmra.org/achievement/). This site includes all the awards available with descriptions and requirements plus contest forms.

Continued from page 1Clinic #4. Animation for Operation Presented by Bill Day


Using slides, this clinic will demonstrate how to animate chutes and doors on ore bins, spouts and counterweights on water tanks, circular movement of water plugs, up and down motion of rollup doors and other structural features that add realism to operation. (Animation for Operation will not cover carousels, Ferris wheels and other structures unrelated to operation). The clinic could also be titled Easy Animation because it uses low-tech materials such as Tortoise switches and turntable motors. A working roll-up door will be used as an instructional device.

Clinic #5. Red Iron, Using Structural Steel to Create Industries and Scenes Presented by Tom Brodrick

We will show some of the use of steel after it leaves the mill and before it becomes a finished building. The emphasis is on distribution from the mill, basic explanations of shapes and their designations, the use of these shapes in the building frame; pictures, descriptions, and ideas about the equipment used in steel erection. Computer slide show with handouts.

Clinic # 6. Making An Urban Backdrop Using the Internet Presented by Marshall Abrams.

We will cover commercial backdrops, backdrop painting ideas especially clouds, getting and using pictures from the internet, manipulating pictures, sharpness, resolution & printing, how to touch-up pictures, and perspective. We will see how to



mock up the scene, paste buildings to backdrop, and use standoff spacers for 3d appearance. Pictures of a finished scene will inspire your modeling. Reference material includes lots of pointers to web resources, a list of top free or shareware photo editors, and a book list. Computer briefing with many examples; briefing handout provided.

Clinic # 7 Rocks Made Easy — Working with Rock Molds & Coloring with Dyes Presented by Bob Johnson.

During this clinic Bob will demonstrate techniques for casting rock molds using molding plaster *Continued on page 5*

Emphasis will be placed on blending the individual castings together and maintaining a realistic bedding plane throughout the formation. He will also demonstrate a quick and easy technique to color the assembled castings using a combination of washes, dyes, chlorine bleach and dry color powders. Bob presented this clinic at the South Mountain Express MER Convention in Hagerstown and was invited to bring it to the Potomac Division. Computer briefing with handouts.

Clinic # 8 An Introduction to Freight-Car Forwarding Systems Presented by Bruce Strickland

The goal of this Clinic would be to inform modeler about the various schemes other model railroaders use to generate freight traffic on their own railroads. The clinic will discuss various aspects of each system including advantages, disadvantages, and administration of each of these systems. The first part of the clinic will talk about what steps the user should do before getting any of the systems into play. In the second part, we will talk about some specifics of several of the popular schemes. A handout will be provided.

Clinic # 9 Introduction to Resin Casting Presented by John Griffith Continued in next column.

This is an introduction to those who would like to do castings. It will provide you the information needed to do your own simple castings. It covers the safety, tools, and materials required. We will talk about making masters, walk through how to prepare a mold from a master, and demonstrate how to cast parts. Along the way I will offer tips on what I find works and what doesn't. Computer briefing. A summary handout including sources of information and supplies will be provided.

Clinic # 10 Rock Faces from Ceiling Tile Presented by Mark Andersen

If you're looking for a simple and easy way to model trap rock, shale type deposits and other sedimentary rocks, then using ceiling tiles is for you! Ceiling tiles are a fireproof paper product that is similar in substance to homasote. The exception is either sand or frit added to it for fire protection. Simply broken, glued together, somewhat carved to your liking, priming, coloring and weathering are all processes that will be demonstrated for the attendees. Handouts will be provided as well.

At the minicon, the Pale Pachyderm makes another appearance. Do you have any goodies that you aren't likely to make use of? Seriously, how many freight cars can you actually use at one time? How many structure kits do you have that you aren't going to build? *Continued on page 7*

On January 9th, I had the pleasure of representing the Potomac Division at a layout tour in Alexandria, Virginia, not far from Mount Vernon. It was at the home of Bob and Dorothy Conley. Bob is the builder and proprietor of an HO scale layout depicting a small town in Pennsylvania on the Middle Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad in early 1940.

As I walked down the basement stairs, I noticed all of Bob's railroad related items. There were books, videos, pictures, and many locomotives displayed around the room. Bob's layout is 4' x 8' in size located at the far end of this railroad themed room. Although not a massive pike, Bob has done a superb job of combining a small town, industry and the feel of some open territory onto this layout.

Unlike many of our layouts, this one is complete with many details. There are two mainline loops with six sidings. The sidings are logically placed and service the many industries. The buildings are removable so that when Bob completes a new structure, he can remove one of the older ones and replace it with the new one. In this way, he can keep his layout fresh and interesting.

Bob has an extensive collection of locomotives and rolling stock that he has acquired over the past 40 years. Most were on display for folks to see. His recent additions include several locomotives from *Broadway Limited* that are equipped with sound. This is a very nice feature that adds a lot to his layout operation.

Thanks to Dorothy, visitors really had a nice spread of snacks and beverages to choose from during their stay. Twenty-seven folks made their way out to Mount Vernon to visit Bob's layout. Many were seen taking photos and Bob received several nice compliments.

Doug Jones' Pennsylvania Railroad

I arrived a few minutes before the layout tour at Doug Jones' was due to start. I knew I was in Pennsy country as I approached the house. The house numbers were displayed on a Pennsy herald. Doug met me at the door. Inside, I knew I was in a railroader's house. Pictures and modeling trophies adorned the walls. On the dinning room table was the biggest, most beautiful Pennsy engine I have seen, but remember I lead a sheltered life.

Doug led me down stairs to the layout. Such confidence is rarely seen. Most layout hosts have their layout up and running to ensure that Murphy hasn't been around. Not Doug, he hadn't even turned on the lights. When he did a great looking, fully finished O scale layout appeared. He turned on the power and the sounds of idling steam filled the room, the trains ran the afternoon without a hitch. Doug contributed the bullet proof layout to operating sessions with his O Scale round robin group every 5th week. I guess he gets more up tight for them than he seemed for us.

The layout was open for the recent O Scale National Convention and bears John Armstrong's influence. The layout is a 39'x18' folded loop with about 200' of main line featuring double track main with 50" minimum curves. The layout has been under construction since 1975. Sound is prevalent throughout. I guess you expect nothing less from an accomplished musician and modeler.

As I wandered the train room, Doug explained what I was looking at. The scratch built steam locomotive that took 2 years to build and that has won several awards, the beautifully detailed passenger and freight cars, and the other highly detailed engines waiting conversion to DCC. It was quite a show. Forty three Potomac Division folks enjoyed the layout and everyone of them was impressed.

Around the Division The Virginia and Western Railroad by Marc Sisk

John Drye and I had the pleasure of representing the Potomac Division at a layout tour in Falls Church, Virginia on March 13th. It was at the home of Doug and Lorrie Kirkpatrick. Doug is the builder and proprietor of the Virginia and Western, an HO scale freelanced steam era layout that hauls people and cargo east and west over the Appalachian Mountains just after World War II. This railroad follows the Norfolk and Western prototype.


Doug's layout is about 550 square feet in size and is currently about 70% complete. A nice sized layout, but appears much larger due to the excellent use of mirrors that extend many views into the perceived distance. The track work was entirely hand laid to include the 80 some turnouts and 40,000 ties. Code 83 was used on the mains and code 70 was used for the sidings. Digitrax Digital Command Control is used and Doug has installed many signals to date.

The layout has many scratch built and Fine Scale Miniatures kits superbly built and weathered. Scenes are logically placed and the detail is excellent. Although the layout is deep in some areas, Doug has provided for lift out portions to gain access if necessary. These lift outs are not apparent unless you ask




