

The Spring Minicon is scheduled for 24 March 2007 at St Mathews Methodist Church, 8617 Little River Turnpike,



Clinic Descriptions

1. *Background Building Using Your Computer & the Internet* - Marshall Abrams

We will cover commercial backdrops, backdrop painting ideas especially clouds, getting and using pictures from the internet, manipulating pictures, sharpness, resolution & printing, how to touch-up pictures, and perspective. We will see how to mock up the scene, paste buildings to backdrop, and use standoff spacers for 3D appearance. Two worked examples will be presented a downtown urban scene and a light industry. Reference material includes lots of pointers to web resources, a list of top free or shareware photo editors, and a book list. Computer

Achievement News by Ed Price and Bill Roman

As mentioned elsewhere in this issue of the FLYER, our next mini-con will be March 24, which should give you about 2 months to complete any projects you'd like to enter in the contest. As usual, we'll have popular vote and Achievement Program judging starting early that morning so models should be entered by 9:00 to allow sufficient time for evaluation and for completion of award certificates. While it has been mentioned before in the FLYER and in a recent issue of the MER LOCAL, paperwork for judging shouldn't be a nerve-racking, time consuming effort. You do need to tell what has been done in terms of design, materials, conformity, finishing, detailing, etc., but not at the level that you might need if you were writing a "how-to" article for the commercial press (e.g., "all bracing was cut from stripwood" versus "Using my ABC Chopper, I carefully cut braces from XYZ lumber to precisely 45 degrees, and used PDQ glue.")

If anyone would like to serve as a contest judge, please contact one of us so that we can make arrangements prior to the minicon. And as always, if you have models that you don't want to bring to the mini, Ed and I will be glad to make arrangements for judging them at your convenience.



my experiences with personal hints and tips for being a successful Model Railroad Author.

4. Building in Wood: flatcar, small freight station, or milk station (Hands-on) - Martin Brechbiel

Building in Wood (Hands-on clinic) will be a "builder's choice" of 3 kits: a flatcar, a small freight station, or a milk station @ a cost of just \$15. Bring your tools! The available numbers of the latter two kits are very limited (2 & 5, respectively), so this is a 1st come, 1st served opportunity, and maybe the last chance to build the small freight station kit!



5. Weathering Rolling Stock - John Drye

There are as many weathering techniques as there are colors of dirt. Two of the most popular are painting with washes and dry-brushes (lots of thinned paint and just a little paint, respectively) and dusting with artists' chalks.

The clinic will look at these techniques as well as ways to show damage, maintenance and repainting.


To see how weathered cars look, the first step is to take a look at prototype cars, to see how nature ruins the railroads' collections. If you model the modern era, all you need to do is to continue to photograph the train after the engines pass. If you model an older era, there is tremendous variety of published material with good color pictures of dirty, rusted dented, stained and grungy rolling stock. Just what we're looking for!

6. Making Palm Trees - Michael Hart

Constructing Pine and Cypress trees of the southeastern U.S., using stick, clay and caulk techniques together w/ tree root branches, build a model from scratch following four easy steps to create a very realistic looking tree. The photo shows the type of trees that will be modeled.



7. Model Railroad Photography - Paul Dolkos

A Portfolio of Prototype Based Layouts. Over the years Paul has photographed many model railroads. In this clinic he will present a selection of photos of many of the layouts and talk about what the builders wanted to accomplish and other stories about the modeler.



8. Creating Brass Stencils for Your Logo - Gil Fuchs

When decals just won't do the job, you can't find them, or you can't get your hands on an Alps printer - create and paint your own logo on your preferred rolling stock using this technique, which is borrowed from the world of PCB production. The process is not very complicated, using your preferred graphic editing program (Corel Draw examples will be shown), and materials available at your local Radio Shack store and on-line. The result is a durable brass stencil that can be used over and over with your airbrush to paint logos on a large number of cars, engines and/or buildings. As an added bonus, the printed logo can be made to have the fuzzy look of sprayed-on lettering, as in the prototype.

Model Contest

There will be a model contest. The convention will open at 8:00 and the cut off for contest model entries will be 09:00. Categories for the model contest will be: Power Units: steam, diesel, and traction; Rolling Stock: passenger, freight, and caboose; Other: non-revenue car, structure, and display. The popular vote contest will include the previous categories plus Favorite Train and Favorite Module/display, and Favorite model by a young modeler (less than 14 years old). We still need volunteers to help with judging, if you are interested please contact Bill Roman or Ed Price. Even if you have not judged before we will train you.

You can enter the mini- to get acquainted with what's involved in a contest and enter again at the Regional or National level. Models entered into the contest can be judged for NMRA AP merit points, but this is not a requirement of the contest. AP requirements, SOQ's and forms can be downloaded from the NMRA web site (<http://www.nmra.org/achievement/>). This site includes all the awards available with descriptions and requirements plus contest forms.

Around the Division

Bob Johnson's West Virginia Midland

It was a beautiful autumn day as I drove up I270 to visit Bob Johnson's West Virginia Midland. As the clouds blew across the sky the scenery was bathed in shadow and bright sunlight. Russet and golden leaves graced the view.

The West Virginia Midland is a freelance standard gauge (HO) short line set in central West Virginia in the early summer of 1954. The Midland's base of operations is the town of Webster Springs, W.Va. where the main yard (all 5 tracks) is located. The primary sources of income for the Midland are coal, limestone and lumber. The main body of the Midland is "E" shaped (12" x 16") with an additional 65 feet of around the wall running. The scenery is about 90% completed and features trees (lots of trees). The layout also features a number of discrete scenes that are visually separated by viewing angles and scenic view blocks such as hills and (of course) trees. The hobo camp is outstanding. In honor of this open house and in keeping with the 1954 time-frame, there was a scale welcome sign for the Dixie Division.

The mountains are constructed using dye and bleach to produce very realistic and unpredictable results. Take a look at Bob's clinic on the PD web page



http://home.comcast.net/~Potomac_NMRA. The hidden track transfer table drawer is ingenious.

The Midland utilizes a Lenz DCC control system and is set-up to accommodate up to 7 operators and a dispatcher during an operating session. The layout was originally point to point but when it was converted to DCC two reverse loops were added to accommodate the increased train operations permitted by DCC operation.

Bob recounted the "disaster" at a recent operating session. One of the bearings on a Shay bound-up and introduced so much drag that it couldn't pull the train up the grade. It was necessary to split the train and double the hill. Helpers were also used. This threw off the timetable, making it necessary to write train orders. Sounds like a lot of operating fun to me.

When asked about the prominently displayed locomotive bell, Bob told us about his detective work identified that it came from B&O E18 #1906. The tone was true and pleasing.

Enjoying ourselves has become a pleasure for many this fall, but have you included rail fanning?

Rail fanning, the art of watching the “real” 12 inch to the foot trains can be enjoyed by all! Have you parked along the Montgomery Fairgrounds access road, sat on one of the many benches at the Alexandria or Manassas, Virginia railroad stations, the Point of Rocks railway station in Maryland, the marina below the route 1 bridge crossing the Occoquan River in Virginia or parked behind Potomac Yards shopping mall in Alexandria, Virginia? I know I've left many other places out, but where else can you add those opportunities to enjoy the real thing is left up to you. The tragic events of 9/11 have left their indelible marks on our hobby, but rail fanning still can still occur.

Introducing yourself to railroad personnel, an officer on duty, a ticket agent or similar authority figures might save time and many explanations that might otherwise ruin a fun outing. Be mindful, that their “No” to your request isn't personal, but the interpretation of the law they must enforce. Many times understanding who is rail fanning is also forgiveness of the rules. Aside from the opportunities of rail fanning and translating observations into modeled ideas on modules, Potomac Module Crew members continued improvements to their modules. Presently, one member is designing a multi module downtown city section with multistory buildings. This past 2006 Halloween weekend, the module crew was invited back by the Tidewater Division's Module Crew for their annual fall show. Representing the “Crew,” Bruce Strickland helped design another layout as the proverbial volunteer. Continuing with the adjusting design, Bruce used Cad Rail 8 to produce the plan for over 60 plus modules in this joint layout. Their modular layout crossed the red and yellow mains at a double diamonds ninety degree crossing. The Lions raised almost \$4,000.00 aside from their ongoing raffles. We are always pleased to assist organizations raise funds for a worthy cause.



us the opportunity to enjoy Herndon's downtown restaurants as well!

As always, our group is always looking for a few new

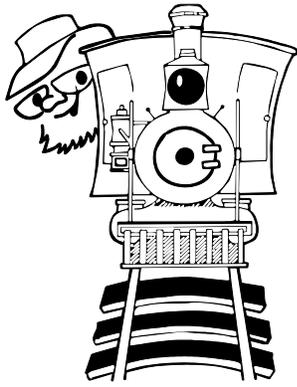


