Swap Meet Set for September 11th!



In addition to the swapping and selling we hope to have some how-to clinics as well as some model railroading videos. For the more adventurous, we will be running the Timesaver switching contest. This switching puzzle is an actual small HO layout loaned to us through the good graces of Action Hobbies of Burke. For a small entry fee you can have a try at setting the best time of the day.

If you want a table on which to display your wares, you must reserve one by September 9th. - Go west on Little River Turnpike about 1 mile to Wakefield Chapel Road.
- Turn left onto Wakefield Chapel Road.
- Take the third entrance into the NOVA campus.
- Park in the areas marked Community Center Building Parking.

In addition to September's swap meet described on page 1, we have two other monthly events this fall. Mark Sunday, October 10th, on your calendars for a very special home layout tour. That day we will visit the understandably famous layout of Howard Zane. Howard is well known in these parts as the organizer, with Ken Young, of the Great Scale Train Show, better known around here simply as the Timonium show. Howard's layout, the Piermont Division of the Western Maryland Railroad, is in class with very few other railraods in terms of scenery and modeling exhibited. It has been featured recently as the cover layout of Model Railroader's April issue and as Volume 12 of Allen Keller's Great Model Railroads video series. features some impressive rolling stock and locomotives and some great scenic effects. The layout models mainline Pennsylvania railroading, no mean feat in any scale let alone O-scale, including Altoona's Horseshoe Curve. Track runs from waist-high at one end to a ceiling-hugging staging yard and reversing loop at the other. This seemingly inaccessible loop is monitored by a closed-circuit television system. Steam power and early diesels, long cuts of hoppers, a priority reefertrain, and a local provided the continuous action. Thanks again to Ed for hosting us.

July saw us return to Jim Strong's G-scale Woodland Railway in Upper Marlboro, Maryland. We don't know how he managed it, but the same day we met at Jim's, he got his layout written up in the Washington Post. The weather cooperated, coming a few days after the July heat wave dissipated. Jim actively recruited young engineers to drive his remotely-controlled, battery-powered trains up and down the backyard mountains. He even let this old editor run a passenger train up the mountain and back.

Last May's home layout tour occurred the weekend that the Summer Dixie Flyer went to press and consequently was not mentioned. We spent May 9th at the two narrow-gauge O-scale layouts of George Johnson and John Peterson in Fairfax County. George Johnson's On3 "Cameron Valley Railroad" is an L-shaped point-topoint layout. It has most structures and track in place, but almost no greenery, making it kind of barren. Still several folks enjoyed seeing the progress he has made-and talking about his other principal interest, theater organs. For added interest, George had his 1-inch scale USRA Light Pacific on display, along with some rolling stock.

The other layout of the day was John Peterson's On2 "Sandy River & Rangeley Lakes," a Maine narrow-gauge line. The quality of workmanship and general appearance of the layout were superb. Everything from handlaid track to hand-built structures modeled after actual buildings on the prototype, John's work is truly

impressive. And although it appears complete, John informed us that he is contemplating some major revisions. Some modelers are never satisfied it seems.

Despite rather warm weather, the Dixie HO Module Team set up at the Alexandria Lyceum last July 3rd. This successful event was the first in what Lyceum officials hope will become a series of annual shows. The display opened to the public at 10 A.M. and trains were operating by 10:15. A total of sixteen modules made up a long rectangular layout. Five modules made their debut: Ken Berthoud had a new straight module and John Doggett had four, including a double-length eight-foot straight module and a four-foot corner: Other team members present included Bruce Strickland, Carl Barna, Ken Heinen, Eric Heinen, and Bob Minnis.

We were joined by Dave Cooper who displayed and ran trolleys (traction) on his four East Penn Standard modules. These modules were joined to the corner of the HO loop via a special transition

module. This same combination will be set-up at the Valley Forge Convention Trade Show this August.

The official head-count for the day was 250. Several expressed an interest in building modules and several mopre became new members of the Dixie Division.



N-TRAK at Valley Forge

I hope that a lot of you got to see the "World's largest N-TRAK Layout" at Valley Forge Express, this year's NMRA National Convention—and enjoyed getting crushed and steamed in the crowds surrounding N-TRAK as I did—and then lived to tell the story. It was great—nothing too rough for a true cinder-sniffer!

There were 252 N-TRAK modules totaling 1106 linear feet on two zig-zag peninsulas and two big, irregular loops. *All* of these modules were connected together through the now famous "Diamond Mill Junction" module consisting of an eight foot circle of six wye junctions each with three tracks leading off in six directions. Operators occupied a central pit. You have to see it work to believe it, and it worked as promised.

By switching through the Diamond Mill, the total route length stretched to 1656 feet (that's 50 scale miles!) and a train took about an hour to complete a circuit if there were no problems. The concerned equipment owners that followed their trains came back exhausted with some wild tales about being stranded on remote sections of track. Some may never return—like the Boston MTA's Charley—or like some convention tour buses—we'll never know....

Saturday was "long train day" and there were probably five or more 100+

car trains running at one time. Up to the time of the convention there had been a lot of concern from many sectors, including the show committee, about the reliability of the Diamond Mill. The whole layout worked well and could have handled a lot more train traffic if more trains had been sent out.

The N-TRAKkers that followed the first trains around the layout Friday experienced some long delays and showed the strain of the trip after being on the road for up to an hour and a half. These travelers were telling stories about some wild out-back stretches of modules and every time they passed Diamond Mill begged to be short-cut back towards their home yards. Later train chasing was complicated by the crush of the crowds and eventually became impossible on the spectator side of the modules.

Five of our Northern Virginia N-TRAK members attended the convention and three of us had the pleasure of operating in the Diamond Mill pit for several hours. (I heard I was taped and on Philadelphia's Channel 6 News one night. I also had an N-TRAK fan ask for my autograph on a diagram of my module in the N-TRAK How-To Manual. All this is heady stuff!) The Diamond Mill operation gradually became automatic and gave me a feeling not unlike that Captain Nemo probably had playing

Nautilus' pipe organ while the giant octopus' limbs snaked all around—and the humidity in the hall was about the same! I haven't seen such crowds since the soccer riots in Italy! Part way into the first day we heard that 19 kids under six years old were lost.

Our group was inspired by the fine modules dis-

played, in all gauges and scales. One N-TRAK module had the best operating hump yard we have ever seen, using compressed air for propulsion in the upper section and for retarding in the lower. Speed control was excellent most of the time.

N scale may have set the convention's standard for quantity and technology, but there were several other fine modular and sectional layouts present. One in particular was the 14' x 20' HO-scale layout of The Porta-Rail Group from Mt. Laurel, New Jersey. It not only had beautiful scenery but also skyboards, overhead lighting, name placards, and brochures that were all coordinated for a very professional look. Our group was impressed and took many notes. Our immediate conclusion was that while you may not be able to coordinate all the modules in your modular layout this way, your group can have a stretch of modules finished as a subdivision in this way. With that in mind, we are game and charged up for the next convention, whenever and wherever that may be.


Our October home layout tour will be hosted by Howard Zane. Many of you have seen this layout in the press, most recently as the cover article of April's *Model Railroader*, but also as Volume 12 of Allen Keller's *Great Model Railroads* video series. More of you may be familiar with Howard as organizer, along with Ken Young, of the Great Scale Train Show, known amongst us local modelers simply as "The Timonium Show."

The Piermont Division of the Western Maryland models West Virginia coal-hauling country in the 1950's. Steam power dominates the roster but the range of motive power spans early diesels and geared steam. The hallmark of Howard's layout, of course, is the scenery. From the first glimpse of Lost Mine through a window cut into the basement stairs to close-ups of Piermont, there is plenty to delight the eye.

The 29' x 27' layout is an around-the-wall scheme with two 48" duck-unders. It is built on an open-frame grid with code 100 Shinohara flextrack laid on homasote-over-spline roadbed. Trackwork specifications include a minimum radius of 36" and a maximum grade of 1.5% with No. 6 minimum turnouts. Track climbs from 54" to 68" above the floor. The scenery base is plaster hardshell over a cardboard web. The backdrop is painted onto 1/8" Masonite and the scenery extends to the ceiling over 65% of the layout. The layout is controlled by a PSI Dynatrol system.

To get to Howard Zane's house:

- Take I-95 to the Md-175 West exit.
- Follow Md-175 West to the sixth light, taking a right onto Thunderhill Road.
- → Howard's home, 5236, is the contemporary house half a mile down on the left. Please note that you will need to go down stairs into the basement to see the layout.



Comments from your Division Superintendent

Layout Tour Etiquette

(Excerpted from the Valley Forge Express Convention Program)

- **Never** pick up someone else's model. If you need a better view, ask your host.
- Never lean on or place anything upon a scenicked layout.
- Don't touch, scratch, feel, or move anything! If you lack self control, put your hands in your pockets. If you are curious about something, simply ask your host.
- Never smoke in the layout room or elsewhere in the house. If you must smoke, ask the host where smoking is permissible. If your host doesn't smoking, don't even ask.
- Don't be so quick to point out a "Better Way" to do something. Tactfully ask why something was done a certain way, then listen to the response—you might learn something.
- **Be tolerant** of scales and skills. If you can't say something nice, well...
- Respect your host's property, both inside and outside the home.

- While on the tour. don't dominate the host's time. Others may have questions or comments, too. The same goes for the best viewing place or photo spot. Let everyone enjoy the layout.
- If you have a camera, be considerate of others. Remember, you are not the only one viewing the layout.
- When you leave, thank your host (and especially their spouse) for allowing you into their home.
- If you bring a guest who is not familiar with the above rules of etiquette, take a few minutes to explain them. You will be doing them and yourself a favor. This goes especially if you are bringing smaller children. You know your child better than anyone else. If you think they can abide by these rules of etiquette, by all means bring them. But if you have reservations, please think twice about bringing them.


Membership Application and Interest Survey


