On 24 March 2007 the Potomac Division held its annual Mini-convention at St Mathews United Methodist Church in Annandale, Virginia. It turned out to be another great event with plenty to keep everyone occupied. The weather wasn't as good as we had last year in Maryland. It was cool and rainy but that meant we had no competition from other out door events. In other words, we had a good day for model railroading. At least the 72 members of the Potomac Division who came out thought so. We were back in Virginia this year for our Minicon. Both the Potomac Module Crew and Northern Virginia NVNTRAK turned out in force. Both set up extensive modular layouts. NVNTRAK's T-TRAK Division set up T-TRAK modules on folding tables to create a layout for the participants enjoyment.

NVNTRAK T-TRAK Division was in action at the NMRA Potomac Division Minicon. NVNTRAK has a small, but active T-TRAK Division and we were pleased to be allowed to set up at the Potomac Division minicon in March. Unfortunately, due to a death in the family, I was called out of town last minute. I was supposed to have been the layout coordinator for the show, but had to bow out with less than a week's notice, so I called up another member and he said he would take the wheel. He stopped by the house the week before the show and I handed him layout diagrams, wires, throttles, and a few other items. I was a little concerned that he might not be ready to head up the show, but after I ran through all of the instructions I had, he responded with "Hooah". You can take the man out of the Army... I knew things would be just fine and they were. I have heard from several folks that the show was a great time and I look forward to a possible return in the future to expand on what we started. I heard that the hosts were great and the gang enjoyed having the opportunity to experiment with switching trains on the layout that we set up.

The same weekend as the minicon, several members of the oNeTRAK C&O Mountain Subdivision headed out to "Wild and Wonderful" West Virginia for the C&O Historical Society Convention at Hawk's Nest. They have a really beautiful layout featuring several prototype locations along the C&O line along the New River. The guys spent lots of evenings hiding in garages getting modules ready for the big show and even had a laser cutter fired up to build a few custom buildings to make the scenes complete. The modules probably still smelled of burned wood at the start of the show since they were working up until the very end. However, I hear the end result was worth all of the effort. I was unable to make the show, but am looking forward to seeing some pictures of how it all

turned out.

In mid-April, we will assemble an NTRAK layout at our monthly Fairfax station show. This is usually one of our smaller layouts, but the crowds are wonderful and there is something really great about sharing the hobby of model railroading in an actual train station. That same weekend as the FFX Station Show, we will have multi-club NTRAK and T-TRAK layouts at the Great Scale Model Train Show in Timonium, MD. This is a two-day show, which is rare for our T-TRAK group so we usually try to bring out all the modules we can muster just to see what it all looks like. The NTRAK gang has recruits coming down from Pennsylvania to set up with us creating a really nice layout for a weekend of great running. After the busy middle of the month, the rest of April is free or train running events for us, but not entirely free of stuff to be done.

We hope to take advantage of a lull in our schedule allow some of our members to become certified to present and/or hand out materials in support of Operation Lifesaver International. We have several members currently who hold this certification, but we are looking to swell the ranks a little bit during an otherwise slow month. OLI does a lot to teach the public, children in particular, about enjoying trains. Our members are able to get to a broad audience through our various shows throughout the year and have been recognized by OLI for their efforts. In addition to the OLI training, the club is going to have our spring trash pickup for our section of Ravensworth Road on the last weekend of April. We have been supporters of the Virginia Adopt-a-highway program for several years, but the task of cleaning up our road had fallen largely to 1 or 2 members of the club for the last couple of years and we all want a chance to wear those sporty orange vest. Therefore, this past winter another member of the club took over responsibility for the club's participation in the program and we will be more vocal about getting members involved to ensure that more of us have the opportunity to wear bright colors, hang out, and pick up trash. OLI and Adopt-a-Highway are both great ways for the club to give

back to the community and to do stuff together that isn't exactly model railroading. We are fortunate to have a gap in the spring schedule to make some progress with these efforts.

May, like April, is another relatively slow month for our club with only 2 public shows on the schedule. The Nn3 Division will be headed up to Chester

County, PA for the Mid-Atlantic Narrow Gauge Guild 24th Annual Model Meet. If you haven't had the chance to see this layout, you really should! These guys do great work and all in Nn3. Board of Directors for the next year. The following were elected John Drye, Bill Day, Marshall Abrams, Mark Andersen, and Bill Demas.



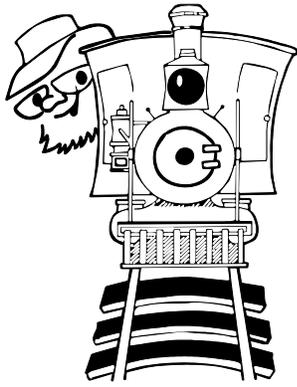


